1 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.

2 In this Act:

3 (1) APPROPRIATE COMMITTEES OF CON4 GRESS.—The term "appropriate committees of Con5 gress" means—

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1	(A) the Committee on Appropriations and
2	the Committee on Veterans' Affairs of the Sen-
3	ate; and
4	(B) the Committee on Appropriations and
5	the Committee on Veterans' Affairs of the
6	House of Representatives.
7	(2) CAPITAL ASSET.—The term "capitals asset"
8	means the physical infrastructure, land, buildings,
9	and other related items under the operation and con-
10	trol of the Department of Veterans Affairs, includ-
11	ing the information technology and other support
12	systems needed to ensure the physical space can be
13	used to deliver intended services and functions of the
14	Department.
15	TITLE I—CAPITAL ASSET
16	MANAGEMENT
17	SEC. 101. ESTABLISHMENT OF OFFICES OF CAPITAL ASSET
18	PERSONNEL AT MEDICAL CENTERS OF DE-
19	PARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS.
20	(a) Offices of Capital Asset Personnel.—
21	(1) IN GENERAL.—By not later than 18 months
22	after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Sec-
23	retary of Veterans Affairs shall ensure that each
24	medical center of the Department of Veterans Af-

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1	fairs has a dedicated office and sufficient staff to
2	conduct—
3	(A) facility planning;
4	(B) long-range capital planning;
5	(C) management of projects and capital as-
6	sets relating to the execution of major construc-
7	tion projects, minor construction projects,
8	major leases, minor leases, non-recurring main-
9	tenance, and related matters at the medical
10	center and facilities of the Department in the
11	catchment area surrounding the medical center;
12	(D) engineering, including matters relating
13	to seismic repairs and projects;
14	(E) maintenance and repair of existing in-
15	frastructure;
16	(F) the collection of views of veterans and
17	employees of the Department to understand the
18	capital assets needs of the Department; and
19	(G) other relevant functions relating to
20	capital assets of the Department as determined
21	by the Secretary.
22	(2) TASKS.—To the greatest extent possible,
23	the Secretary shall ensure that each of the require-
24	ments under paragraph (1) are held by a different
25	individual or group of individuals so as not to over-

1	burden a small number of individuals with such re-
2	quirements.
3	(3) LEAD OFFICIAL.—The Secretary shall des-
4	ignate one individual as the lead senior official re-
5	sponsible for integration and coordination of, and
6	accountability for, the functions described in sub-
7	paragraph (A) through (F) of paragraph (1).
8	(4) Staffing model.—
9	(A) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall
10	maintain a staffing model for the offices under
11	paragraph (1) that ensures a minimum base
12	level of capital asset staffing.
13	(B) UPDATE.—The Secretary shall update
14	the staffing model under subparagraph (A) reg-
15	ularly to ensure it is effective in achieving the
16	goals of this section.
17	(5) TREATMENT OF STATES AND TERRITORIES
18	WITHOUT A MEDICAL CENTER.—In the case of a
19	State or territory of the United States in which the
20	Department does not operate a full-service medical
21	center, the office required under paragraph (1) shall
22	be located at the largest medical facility of the De-
23	partment in that State or territory, and any ref-
24	erence in this section to a medical center shall be
25	deemed to be a reference to that medical facility.

1 (b) QUALIFICATIONS.—The Secretary shall establish 2 appropriate professional certifications, educational back-3 ground, and other qualifications to be required of individ-4 uals employed at a position in an office described in sub-5 section (a) to manage the duties of such position under 6 this section.

7 (c) DUTIES.—

8 (1) IN GENERAL.—The duties of an office de9 scribed in subsection (a) for a medical center of the
10 Department shall include the following:

(A) The development, monitoring, and implementation of capital asset objectives for the
catchment area surrounding the medical center,
including community-based outpatient clinics
and other sites of care of the Department in
that area.

17 (B) The coordination of capital asset man18 agement and planning with counterparts at
19 other medical centers of the Department in the
20 region and facility planners for the Veterans In21 tegrated Service Network or Networks in the
22 region.

23 (C) Effective delivery of capital asset24 projects.

(D) Maintenance and repair of existing in frastructure.

3 (E) Constantly monitoring the needs of 4 veterans and employees of the Department as it 5 relates to medical space and services at the 6 medical center and facilities in the catchment 7 area surrounding the medical center to forward 8 plan and identify and submit plans, through 9 processes of the Department, to meet those 10 needs, including by formulating local and re-11 gional capital improvement and asset manage-12 ment plans for medical facilities of the Depart-13 ment through the regular collection of—

(i) views and expectations of veterans
in that area who are eligible users of
health care and related services provided
by the Department with respect to—

(I) preferences and needs of
those veterans for the care received
from medical facilities of the Department in that area; and

(II) the need for improvements
and enhancements to infrastructure of
the Department; and

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1	(ii) views of relevant medical staff of
2	the Department at the medical center and
3	facilities in that catchment area regarding
4	their preferences and needs for how to de-
5	liver health care to veterans and how those
6	preferences impact the infrastructure
7	needs of the Department.
8	(F) Having an understanding of the cap-
9	ital asset policies, procedures, and directives of
10	the Department, including those issued by the
11	central office of the Department, Veterans Inte-
12	grated Service Networks, the Veterans Health
13	Administration, the Office of Information and
14	Technology, the Office of Management, the Of-
15	fice of Acquisition, Logistics, and Construction,
16	the Office of General Counsel, or any successor
17	offices, and any other office of the Department
18	with significant responsibility over capital asset
19	management and planning.
20	(G) Implementing locally those policies,
21	procedures, and directives.
22	(H) Providing feedback regarding ways in
23	which those policies, procedures and directives
24	can be improved.

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1	(I) Having an understanding of the impor
	(I) Having an understanding of the impor-
2	tance for collaboration and coordination among
3	all relevant offices of the Department, including
4	the Office of Acquisition, Logistics, and Con-
5	struction, the Office of Asset Enterprise Man-
6	agement, the Office of Information and Tech-
7	nology, and other internal stakeholders as re-
8	quired to achieve success in all phases of capital
9	asset management.
10	(2) Collection of views and expecta-
11	TIONS.—
12	(A) IN GENERAL.—Views and expectations
13	may be collected under paragraph $(1)(E)$
14	through multiple channels and the process used
15	for such collection shall ensure that the views
16	and expectations collected provide a representa-
17	tive sample of the population from which such
18	views and expectations are collected.
19	(B) Confidentiality.—Any information
20	collected under paragraph $(1)(E)$ shall be col-
21	lected in a manner that provides an option for
22	submission of views that are anonymous and
23	confidential.
24	(C) INCLUSION OF DIVERSE VIEW-
25	POINTS.—In collecting views and expectations

1	of veterans and medical staff under paragraph
2	(1)(E), an office described in subsection (a) for
3	a medical center of the Department shall ensure
4	that the viewpoints of a diverse population of
5	veterans being served by the medical center and
6	medical staff of the medical center or in the
7	catchment area of the medical center are cap-
8	tured.
9	(d) Development of Standard Process to So-
10	LICIT VIEWS ON EFFECTIVENESS.—
11	(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall develop
12	a standardized process to regularly solicit feedback
13	from individuals and entities described in paragraph
14	(2) regarding the effectiveness of and ways to im-
15	prove—
16	(A) the infrastructure and asset manage-
17	ment investment processes and procedures of
18	the central office of the Department and Vet-
19	erans Integrated Service Networks of the De-
20	partment; and
21	(B) the guidance of the central office and
22	Veterans Integrated Service Networks regard-
23	ing such processes and procedures to the med-
24	ical centers, facilities in the catchment area of

1	those medical centers, and Veterans Integrated
2	Service Networks, as appropriate.
3	(2) Individuals and entities described.—
4	The individuals and entities described in this para-
5	graph are the following:
6	(A) Each office described in subsection (a)
7	for a medical center of the Department.
8	(B) Medical staff of the Department at fa-
9	cilities in the catchment area of the medical
10	center.
11	(C) Veterans Integrated Service Networks.
12	(D) Staff of offices within the central of-
13	fice of the Department, including the Office of
14	Acquisition, Logistics, and Construction, the
15	Office of Asset Enterprise Management, the Of-
16	fice of Information and Technology, and the Of-
17	fice of Healthcare Environment and Facilities
18	Programs.
19	(3) Confidentiality.—Any information col-
20	lected under paragraph (1) shall be collected in a
21	manner that provides an option for submission of
22	views that are anonymous and confidential.
23	(e) USE OF REPORT FINDINGS.—The Secretary shall
24	use the results of the report required under section 202

in establishing the offices required under subsection (a) 1 2 and carrying out any other requirements of this section. 3 SEC. 102. DEVELOPMENT OF PERFORMANCE METRICS OF 4 CAPITAL ASSET MANAGEMENT BY DEPART-5 MENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS AND MONI-6 TORING FOR IMPROVEMENT. 7 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than one year after the 8 date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Vet-9 erans Affairs shall— 10 (1) develop meaningful and measurable goals 11 and metrics— 12 (A) to assess the performance of the cap-13 ital asset management programs of the Depart-14 ment of Veterans Affairs to allow the Secretary 15 to make sound decisions regarding construction, 16 leasing, acquisition, maintenance, and disposal 17 of capital assets; and 18 (B) that are in alignment with Department 19 strategic plans, budgets, and mission to serve 20 veterans, their families, and caregivers; 21 (2) develop an internal dashboard or other tool 22 to monitor progress towards meeting those goals; 23 (3) establish and implement internal governance 24 processes to direct necessary improvements to

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strengthen performance and achievement of those
 goals; and

3 (4) submit to appropriate committees of Con4 gress a report on the development of those goals and
5 metrics in paragraph (1) and the implementation of
6 the internal dashboard or other tool under para7 graph (2) and the internal governance process under
8 paragraph (3).

9 (b) INTERNAL DASHBOARD.—The Secretary shall en-10 sure that the internal dashboard developed under sub-11 section (a)(2) includes meaningful and relevant goals with 12 related metrics that—

(1) would evaluate capital asset management
performance of the Department and provide relevant
information to guide necessary improvements; and

16 (2) are developed consistent with recommenda17 tions set forth by the Comptroller General of the
18 United States.

(c) CONSIDERATION OF PART TWO OF STRATEGIC
PLAN TO IMPROVE VA'S DELIVERY AND MANAGEMENT
OF CAPITAL ASSET.—In developing the internal dashboard under subsection (a)(2), the Secretary shall consider
the findings in part two of the Strategic Plan to Improve
VA's Delivery and Management of Capital Asset required
under section 202(a)(4).

1SEC. 103. EXPANSION OF MEMBERSHIP OF THE CAPITAL2ASSET PLANNING COMMITTEE.

3 Not later than 180 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, in order to facilitate Federal health in-4 5 frastructure planning, coordination, and investment, the Deputy Secretary of Veterans Affairs and the Under Sec-6 7 retary of Defense for Personnel and Readiness shall mod-8 ify the membership of the Capital Asset Planning Com-9 mittee established as a subordinate entity of the Depart-10 ment of Veterans Affairs-Department of Defense Joint 11 Executive Committee established under section 320 of title 12 38, United States Code, to include the following:

13 (1) Not fewer than one officer or employee of14 the Indian Health Service.

15 (2) Not fewer than one officer or employee of
16 the Department of Health and Human Services who
17 is not an employee of the Indian Health Service.

19 SEC. 201. REVIEW OF CLIMATE RESILIENCE OF FACILITIES,

20 LAND, AND OTHER RELEVANT CAPITAL AS21 SETS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS
22 AFFAIRS.

(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Veterans Affairs
shall conduct a comprehensive review of the climate resilience of facilities, land, and other relevant capital assets
under the authority and jurisdiction of the Secretary.

1	(b) Elements.—
2	(1) IN GENERAL.—The review conducted under
3	subsection (a) shall—
4	(A) provide a comprehensive assessment of
5	existing facilities, land, and other relevant cap-
6	ital assets that may be at risk due to changes
7	in the climate, including potential vulnerabilities
8	related to—
9	(i) proximity to a body of water;
10	(ii) proximity to an area prone to
11	flooding;
12	(iii) proximity to an area prone to
13	wild fire;
14	(iv) proximity to an area prone to tor-
15	nadoes, hurricanes, or other storms; and
16	(v) such other matters as the Sec-
17	retary considers appropriate after con-
18	sulting with the United States Global
19	Change Research Program on the best
20	available observations and forward-looking
21	climate projections by region, including sea
22	level rise data;
23	(B) include a description of strategies to
24	improve the climate resilience of existing facili-
25	ties, land, and other relevant capital assets at

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risk due to changes in the climate, including po-2 tential modifications to facility operations and 3 maintenance practices, and the cost of such 4 strategies;

5 (C) include an analysis of the design 6 standards and building codes used by the De-7 partment of Veterans Affairs to site, plan, 8 build, lease, renovate, and purchase land, facili-9 ties, infrastructure, and other capital assets of 10 the Department and whether those design 11 standards and building codes reflect both ob-12 served and forward-looking climate information;

(D) include an analysis of the effect of climate change on energy usage, energy sources, and utility systems of the Department and the Department's mitigation strategies;

17 (E) use, in consultation with the United 18 States Global Change Research Program, for-19 ward-looking climate information and other pro-20 jections to anticipate changing environmental 21 conditions during the design life of existing or 22 planned facilities, land, and other capital assets 23 of the Department and make relevant decisions 24 and planning strategies based on this informa-25 tion;

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1 (F) after consulting with the United States 2 Global Change Research Program and other 3 relevant Federal and non-Federal entities, in-4 clude recommendations for best practices, 5 standards, and solutions for future placement, 6 planning, renovation, leasing, purchase, and 7 construction of facilities and land of the De-8 partment so as to avoid or mitigate the chal-9 lenges resulting from placing a facility in an 10 area at risk of being vulnerable to harm from 11 the impacts of changing environmental condi-12 tions; and 13 (G) assess how the Department can incor-14 porate climate resilience information into its processes and procedures for capital asset in-15 16 vestment decisions. 17 (2) Sources of information and projec-18 TIONS.—Sources of information and projections used 19 under paragraph (1)(E) may include the Bureau of 20 the Census (for population projections), the National 21 Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine (for land use change projections and climate projec-22 23 tions), the United States Geological Survey (for land 24

use change projections), the United States Global

Change Research Program and the National Climate

1 Assessment (for climate observations and projec-2 tions), and such other sources as the Secretary con-3 siders reliable in consultation with the United States 4 Global Change Research Program. 5 (c) REPORT.— 6 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than one year 7 after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Sec-8 retary shall submit to the appropriate committees of 9 Congress a report detailing the results of the review 10 conducted under subsection (a) and the actions the 11 Secretary will take in response to the findings of 12 such review. 13 (2) ELEMENTS.—The report required by para-14 graph (1) shall include the following: 15 (A) Recommendations for legislative and 16 administrative action to mitigate and respond 17 to the findings contained in the review con-18 ducted under subsection (a). 19 (B) A description of action to be taken by 20 the Secretary to improve the climate resilience

20 the Secretary to improve the chinate residence
21 of existing facilities, land, infrastructure and
22 other capital assets under the jurisdiction or
23 control of the Department.

24 (C) A description of changes in policy, di25 rectives, and procedures of the Department to

1	mitigate, plan for, and improve resilience of fu-
2	ture constructed, leased, or other facilities,
3	land, and other relevant capital assets under
4	the jurisdiction or control of the Department.
5	(D) A description of how the Department
6	will incorporate climate resilience information
7	into its processes and procedures for capital
8	asset investment decisions.
9	(E) A description of changes the Depart-
10	ment will make to ensure the facilities, land,
11	and other relevant capital assets of the Depart-
12	ment are available to furnish care and services
13	under section 1785 of title 38, United States
14	Code, during or following a disaster or emer-
15	gency.
16	(F) The estimated cost to implement the
17	changes described in the report.
18	(G) The estimate timeline to implement
19	the changes described in the report.
20	(H) Such other matters, recommendations,
21	or requests as the Secretary considers appro-
22	priate.
23	(3) UPDATES.—
24	(A) IN GENERAL.—Not later than five
25	years after the date on which the Secretary

submits the report under paragraph (1) and not
less frequently than once every five years thereafter until the date that is 21 years after the
date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary
shall submit to the appropriate committees of
Congress an update of the report submitted
under paragraph (1).

8 (B) CONTENTS.—Each update submitted 9 under subparagraph (A) shall described the ef-10 forts of the Department since the submittal of 11 the latest report or update, as the case may be, 12 relating to matters covered by the report and 13 such other matters as the Secretary considers 14 appropriate

15 (d) CLIMATE RESILIENCE DEFINED.—In this sec-16 tion, the term "climate resilience" means—

(1) anticipating, preparing for, and adapting to
changing environmental conditions such as variations in average weather conditions that persist
over multiple decades or longer that encompass increases and decreases in temperature, shifts in precipitation, and changing risk of certain types of severe weather events; and

1 (2) the ability to withstand, respond to, and re-2 cover rapidly from disruptions while ensuring the 3 sustainment of mission-critical operations. 4 SEC. 202. REPORTS ON CAPITAL ASSET PLANNING, MAN-5 AGEMENT, BUDGETING, STAFFING, AND PER-6 FORMANCE OF DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS 7 AFFAIRS. 8 (a) INITIAL REPORT.— 9 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than one year 10 after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Sec-11 retary of Veterans Affairs shall submit to the appro-12 priate committees of Congress a report on the plan-13 ning, management, budgeting, staffing, and perform-14 ance by the Department of Veterans Affairs relating 15 to capital assets. Such report shall be known as the 16 "Strategic Plan to Improve VA's Delivery and Man-17 agement of Capital Assets" (in this subsection re-18 ferred to as the "Report"). 19 (2) STRUCTURE.—The Report shall consist of 20 not fewer than two parts as set forth in this sub-21 section. 22 (3) PART ONE.— 23 (A) IN GENERAL.—Part one of the Report 24 shall focus on the human capital needs for the 25 capital asset and related areas workforce of the

1	Department (in this subsection referred to as
2	"Part One").
3	(B) ELEMENTS.—Part One shall include
4	the following:
5	(i) A description of the steps being
6	taken by the Department, and the steps
7	that the Department plans to take during
8	the 10-year period following the date of the
9	Report, including a specific timeline, to en-
10	sure sufficient capital asset personnel at
11	the local, regional, and central office levels
12	of the Department are available and pre-
13	pared to—
14	(I) execute the current level of
15	capital asset work, including mainte-
16	nance, delivery of new facilities, dis-
17	posal, and reuse;
18	(II) handle future capital asset
19	work described in subclause (I) during
20	such 10-year period; and
21	(III) perform any other capital
22	asset activities as identified by the
23	Secretary.

1	(ii) A plan that addresses the needed
2	capital asset workforce of the Department
3	by—
4	(I) identifying and describing the
5	staffing needs and status of such
6	workforce, including—
7	(aa) the number of currently
8	authorized positions;
9	(bb) the number of filled po-
10	sitions of those positions author-
11	ized;
12	(cc) the number of unfilled
13	positions of those positions au-
14	thorized, including reasons why
15	those positions are not filled and
16	steps the Department is taking
17	to fill those positions;
18	(dd) the number of current
19	positions needed above the level
20	currently authorized; and
21	(ee) future needs, including
22	expected growth or reduction,
23	during the 10-year period fol-
24	lowing the date of the Report;

(II) providing the data under 1 2 subclause (I) at the Departmental 3 level, disaggregated by relevant divi-4 sions of the Department and by— 5 (aa) data for the Veterans 6 Health Administration, broken 7 out by field, Veterans Integrated 8 Service Network, and central of-9 fice, including the Office of 10 Healthcare Environment and Fa-11 cilities Programs; 12 (bb) data for the Office of 13 Acquisition, Logistics, and Con-14 struction, broken out by field, re-15 gion, and central office; 16 (cc) data for the National 17 Cemetery Administration, broken 18 out by field, region, and central 19 office; 20 (dd) data for the Veterans 21 Benefits Administration, broken 22 out by field, region, and central 23 office; 24 (ee) data for the Office of 25 Asset Enterprise Management;

1	(ff) data for the Office of
2	Information and Technology, bro-
3	ken out by field, region, and cen-
4	tral office; and
5	(gg) data for all other of-
6	fices of the Department not cov-
7	ered under items (aa) through
8	(ff) that have capital asset staff
9	or significant capital asset re-
10	sponsibilities at the field, re-
11	gional, or central office level; and
12	(III) including an estimate of the
13	funding required to accomplish filling
14	the unfilled and future positions speci-
15	fied under subclause (I) during the
16	10-year period following the date of
17	the Report.
18	(iii) A description of the efforts taken
19	and planned to be taken by the Depart-
20	ment to recruit, retain, and develop the ex-
21	isting and future capital asset workforce of
22	the Department.
23	(iv) A description of any changes
24	needed to the qualifications, standards, po-
25	sition descriptions and other related mat-

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ters to ensure the qualification standards
of the workforce—
(I) match the needs of the De-
partment; and
(II) align where appropriate with
relevant Federal Government and in-
dustry standards and best practices.
(v) A description of how the Depart-
ment will coordinate the human capital ef-
forts of the Department across the Vet-
erans Health Administration, the Office of
Acquisition, Logistics, and Construction,
the National Cemetery Administration, the
Veterans Benefits Administration, the Of-
fice of Asset Enterprise Management, and
other entities of the Department so as to
leverage collective efforts, reduce unneces-
